# National Alzheimer's **Association Provides Assist for Caregivers**

FINDING SUPPORT

**National Mental Health Awareness month emphasizes** resources for those who struggle to care for loved ones.

Nettie Lamay is one of more than 11 million Americans who provide unpaid care for people with Alzheimer's disease or dementia, like her late husband, Bruce, who began to show signs of dementia in early 2021.

than 827,000 caregivers in Florida, with 28.6% reporting that they are depressed. Alzheimer's caregivers also report higher rates of chronic conditions including stroke, heart disease, diabetes and cancer compared to non-caregivers.

"I was very drained, and I didn't know what to do," Lamay said. "I had to be strong for Bruce."

ike many Alzheimer's and **⊿**dementia patients, Bruce suffered from paranoid delusions. One night he attacked Nettie after mistaking her for an assailant and was arrested while she was rushed to the hospital. He was held for two weeks.

"It tore me up," Nettie said. "They even prosecuted him like he was a bad guy."

For Nettie, the most challenging aspect of caring for Bruce was lack of support. She went through three separate care options before finding a place that would take Bruce after the attack.

She said she would have been lost without her neighbors and guidance from specialists at The Villages

"Dr. Burgess and Melissa Denham were a godsend,' Nettie said.

Denham, a licensed nurse practitioner and dementia care specialist with The Villages Health, said a common challenge caregivers face is not knowing what resources are available or how to utilize them.

"Being a caregiver requires so much of a person, and

generally, as their loved one's disease progresses, it takes more and more," Denham said. "If the caregiver doesn't utilize their local resources, they will experience burnout at some point."

Caregivers can be at risk for caregiver stress syndrome, a condition characterized by mental, physical and emotional exhaustion.

"This can happen when the caregiver neglects their own health to focus on their loved one's health and needs,' Denham said.

In 2011, the National Study of Caregiving reported greater caregiver satisfaction was associated with more emotional support from family and friends.

"A lot of times caregivers keep the struggles to themselves as they feel they don't want to burden anyone," Denham said. "It's overwhelming and many times their family and friends want to help, they just don't know

The Villages Health has many resources for caregivers, including counseling for primary care patients and the Behavioral Health department's Tandem Care Program, a collaborative approach to mental health in which patients are assigned a team to oversee care and check in every other week.

Another resource The Villages Health offers is the Dementia Care Coordination Program, an 11-week program providing resources and support to families dealing with dementia.

Cynthia Russell, a caregiver working with the Dementia Care Coordination Program, recently started an Alzheimer's caregiver support group at Del Webb Spruce Creek. Her husband, Roy, was diagnosed with moderate Alzheimer's shortly after moving to The Villages in September 2021.

"I was devastated, and I felt a little bit helpless," Cynthia said. "Here we thought we were going to retire."

To cope with

uncertainty, Cynthia threw herself into learning as much about Alzheimer's as she could. She took the virtual dementia tour offered by The Villages Health three times and began seeing a grief counselor.

"It's a grieving process seeing your loved one in decline," she said.

Cynthia also started training her dog, Teddy, to be a therapy dog to prepare for when Roy needs to transition into memory care.

her own use wasn't enough. "If The Villages Health is helping me, I feel like I have to give back," she said.

"There's a lot of people who

have dementia and Alzheim-

er's who haven't dealt with it." With a little push from Denham and her counselor, Cynthia started a support group exclusively for members of the Del Webb community.

"Everyone gets a chance to share what they're going through," Cynthia said. "We give advice, share resources and offer support."

Since Bruce's death on August 29, 2022, Nettie joined a local widows' group. Most of her life before was dedicated to caring for Bruce, so meeting with her new friends gives her the opportunity to get out and explore The Villages more. They play golf together and go to breakfast at Fenney Grill every Thursday.

"I started to laugh again," she said.

Nettie said she still feels guilty about her inability to help take care of Bruce at home, regardless of his decline. However, time and the levity of the widows' group have allowed her to begin healing.

She encourages other caregivers who have experienced something similar to join a support group around them.


"I don't want to see anyone go through what I went through," Nettie said. "Give yourself time, but get out there.'
