

# **Upper Endoscopy (EGD) Preparation Instructions**

You are scheduled for an upper GI endoscopy (also called an EGD) at \_\_\_\_\_\_. Please read the following information carefully.

- A Surgery Scheduler will contact you with the date of your procedure. If you cannot make your
  appointment our office must be notified of all procedure cancellations and reschedules at least
  two business days prior to the procedure. To <u>CANCEL or RESCHEDULE</u> a procedure, please
  call 352-674-8716.
- The Surgery Center will contact you **within 1-2 days** of your scheduled procedure to confirm your procedure time and check-in time.
- Our Physicians strive to stay on schedule and frequently are ahead of schedule. Due to
  emergencies, we occasionally have delays. We apologize in advance if this should occur, and you
  or your driver is inconvenienced in any way.

Failure to follow preparation instructions exactly may cause your procedure to be delayed or rescheduled to a later date.

WHAT IS AN I	EGD?
--------------	------

An EGD is a test to examine the esophagus, stomach, and first part of the small intestine. Just before the procedure starts you will gargle with medicine to numb your throat. You will then be given medications to make you sleepy. The doctor will pass a flexible tube that has a small camera and headlight to see the inside of your esophagus, stomach, and small intestine on a TV monitor. The doctor can take biopsies of any abnormal areas. You will wake up shortly after the test. Most people do not remember having the procedure.

### HOW TO PREPARE FOR AN EGD?

# 7 DAYS BEFORE YOUR EGD:

- You should stop taking non-steroidal anti-inflammatory (NSAID) medications, such as ibuprofen, Motrin, Aleve, Advil, Naproxen or prescriptive NSAIDs.
- You may continue to take aspirin if your doctor recommended you ordinarily take it. If no doctor
  has ever recommended aspirin, then you should not take any aspirin starting 7 days before the
  procedure.
- If you take any of the following blood thinning/anticoagulation medicines, then you need to discuss what to do in preparation of this procedure with the prescribing provider or your gastroenterologist.
  - Plavix (Clopidogrel)
- Eliquis (Apixaban)



- Coumadin (Warfarin)
- Fragmin (Dalteparin)
- Arixtra (Fondaparinux)
- Praxada (Dabigatran)
- Brilinta (Ticagrelor)
- Pletal (Cilostazole)
- Lovenox (Enoxaparin)
- Effient (Parasugrel)
- Xarelto (Rivaroxban)
- Jantoven (Warfarin)

#### 1 DAY BEFORE YOUR EGD:

- If you have diabetes, we recommend you take only one-half the dose of long-acting insulin (e.g., Lantus) the night before the endoscopy.
- Do NOT have any solid food after 11:59 PM the night before the EGD.

### THE DAY OF YOUR EGD:

- What to eat: You CANNOT eat any food, suck candy, or chew gum until after the endoscopy is over.
- What to drink: You may drink water, black coffee (without sugar, milk, or cream), apple juice, soda pop, or club soda. Stop drinking these liquids at least 4 hours before the EGD.
- Also, if you are scheduled to have a colonoscopy at the same time as the EGD you should take
  your colonoscopy preparation as directed on the colonoscopy instruction form.
- Please note: If your appointment is scheduled in the afternoon, you may have clear liquids in moderation up to 4 hours prior to the arrival time you are given by the surgery center.
- Medications: Do NOT take any medication for diabetes or diuretics (such as Lasix/furosemide)
   You may take your other medications, inclusive of blood pressure medications with a small amount of liquid up to four hours before the EGD.
- What to bring: Please bring a list of your medications.
- Arrive at least 60 minutes before your scheduled appointment.
- If you choose to have the EGD performed with medication for sedation (most people do) you must be accompanied by an adult who can drive, you home after the test. The exam will not be done unless a person at least 18 years old comes with you and stays in the GI Procedure waiting room during the exam.
- You should expect to spend up to 4 hours in our procedure's unit, longer if you are scheduled to have an additional test done on the same day.

### AFTER THE EGD:

After the EGD is completed, we will observe you in a recovery area for approximately 30 minutes. Before you leave, the doctor will explain the results of the exam and give you a report and instructions. If you received sedative medications, then the person who came with you must sign you out and drive you home. You cannot drive or go back to work for at least 12 hours. If you were not given medication for sedation, you will be able to walk, drive or take a van, bus, or taxi after the exam.
