

From Local Health Researchers



Chronic inflammation and poverty are known to increase mortality risk. A study led by University of Florida College of Public Health and Health Professions researchers found that, when combined, the two factors increase the risk exponentially. Individuals living with both chronic inflammation and poverty had a 127% increased risk for dying from heart disease and a 196% increased risk for dying from cancer. People living with chronic
