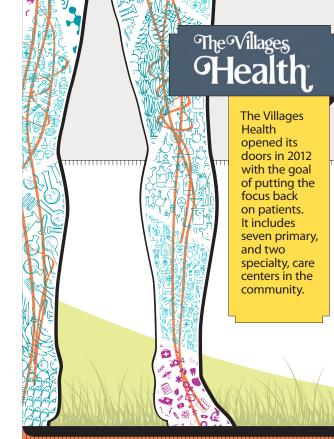

K2 Summit Research is a clinical research office in The Villages that focuses on dementia, particularly Alzheimer's disease. The office holds clinical trials on Alzheimer's treatment including research on drugs such as Leqembi. The drug was greenlit through the Food and Drug Administration's accelerated approval pathway last year. The office also offers free memory screenings, as well as seminars on Alzheimer's disease. New research shows cholesterol can interfere with pain control. Rubbing an injury helps trigger the body's pain-relieving capabilities.
